

Referral

CREOKS will consider any child or adolescent 0-18 years of age that have been screened as needing further assessment and treatment for a neurodiverse condition (Autism Spectrum, ADHD, or OCD).

Please submit the CREOKS Children's Services Referral Form and provide the following:

- Include on the form that this is a referral to **"Array of Hope"**.
- Attach copies of the screening used or the results of those screenings.
- Attach a short narrative that
 - (a) describes the behaviors or the concerns that led to the decision to screen the child; and
 - (b) how have these concerns resulted in disruption in the child's daily life or functioning in school, home or in play, etc.

Array of Hope

is a multidisciplinary team approach offering behavioral and medical services for children 0 -18 years of age who may have a neurodiverse diagnosis (through screening or previous evaluation) such as an Autism

Spectrum Disorder, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, or Obsessive Compulsive Disorder.

Services are provided in the community, as well as in our clinics. Array of Hope is designed to support children from underserved communities and increase access to specialized services which can include psychological testing, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech/language therapy, and nutrition services.

Our Specialized Team

Children enrolled in the program will benefit from a collection of specialized caregivers, which include:

- Licensed Psychologist
- Occupational Therapist
- Physical Therapist
- Registered Dietitian
- Licensed Speech Pathologist
- Care Coordination
- Family Support Provider
- Licensed Behavioral Health Therapist
- Community Educator



Individualized Care

Licensed Psychologist. The psychologist works in partnership with early childhood programs and schools in the underserved communities of Tulsa County to provide psychological assessment to children with neurodiversity (e.g., ASD, AD/HD, OCD). Evaluation and testing can be utilized as a starting point for the provision of recommendations, support, or intervention for identified children, families, and caregivers.

Occupational Therapist. The occupational therapist addresses sensory sensitivity challenges that are common among neurodiverse children, as well as help develop plans to improve success at home and at school.



Physical Therapist. The physical therapist identifies, diagnoses, and treats movement problems that can be present among children with neurodiverse conditions.

Registered Dietitian. The registered dietitian designs nutrition programs to protect health, prevent allergic reactions, and alleviate the symptoms of disease.

Licensed Speech Pathologist. The speech-language pathologist will help improve the child's ability to communicate in more useful and functional ways.

Care Coordinator. The certified case manager, with appropriate consent, ensures that each child has a collaborative plan developed among all child-serving providers, coordinates care between providers, and facilitates referrals for needed services.



Behavioral Health Therapist.

The therapists will provide individual and family therapy to address the emotional and psychosocial challenges that children with neurodiverse diagnoses may experience. The therapists have been trained in a variety of treatment modalities to support children and their families such as AutPlay Therapy, Parent Child Interaction Therapy, Child Parent Psychotherapy, Attachment and Biobehavioral Catchup, and Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy.



Family Support Provider. The Family Support Provider has lived experience raising a child with a mental health diagnosis or challenging behavior. They also have

experience navigating various systems in a child's life such as school, child welfare, juvenile justice, etc. This team member will provide coaching and support to parents/caregivers as they work towards their family's goals.



Community Educator. The Community Educator provides outreach and education to schools, medical providers, and other community agencies likely to screen and identify children in need of behavioral and medical services to address neurodiverse conditions. The Community Educator also organizes support groups for family members of children with neurodiverse conditions and shares their own personal experience, strength, and hope as a family member of an individual with neurodiverse conditions.
